



Parent Tips for Virtual Learning



1.Create a Consistent Learning Environment:


- Determine a family space so that you are accessible to check-in, monitor progress, and assist/support your children.
- Designate a "Quiet-Study/Learning Zone". Agree to a space that is for "learning" and create some "learning expectations". For example- free from outside noise, no TV, separated from siblings, etc.
- Have resources/materials ready before the day starts (i.e. markers, paper, rulers, etc.) for your child to be successful with their activities.
 Remember to plan ahead and review due dates to have materials ready.
- Proper desk/table and seating that allows your child(ren) to be comfortable when learning.



2. Start and Finish each day with quick check-ins:

- Keep it as a simple check-in with your child(ren). Although brief, this
 can be a very powerful conversation that matters. This time allows
 children to process the instructions they've received from their
 teachers. It helps them organize and set priorities. Parents should
 establish these check-ins at regular times each day and possibly even
 write down a schedule for the day with further check-in times.
- Check calendars and assignments together to review anything that is due.
- Make a plan to utilize teacher office hours that day and write questions down together that may need to be answered.
- Ask your child(ren):
- ⇒ What are you learning today?
- ⇒ What are the learning goals?
- ⇒ How will you spend your time? (consider setting a schedule that can be easily followed by your children)
- ⇒ What resources do you require?
- ⇒ How can I help?

Parent Tips for Virtual Learning, continued...

3. Routines and Expectations for at Home Learning:

- Set regular learning hours. If possible, align these hours with the school day and during times that your children are most attentive.
- Write down a schedule for each child (or if appropriate, have your child create a schedule) with built-in breaks for snacks, outdoor movement/ exercise and playtime. Check off items as completed -- children love the sense of accomplishment! Younger children might also be motivated by short goals, i.e. "complete two activities from your teacher and then we'll play a family game."
- At school, cellphones are kept in backpacks. Consider doing the same at home until assignments are completed (or use as a social break after a certain number of assignments are completed).
- Stick with a consistent sleep routine- wake up at the same time, go to bed at the same time.

4. Establish "Think Time" for your child:

- One challenge for families with multiple children is managing each of their needs. You might consider having siblings work in different rooms to avoid distraction.
- Headphones provide opportunities for learners to focus and avoid distraction.
- You may need to stagger the online work time for each child.

5. Encourage Exercise:

- Build in time for movement and stretches.
- Get outside and play.
- Encourage your child(ren) to do something helpful around the house.

6. Provide opportunities for social interactions:

- When possible, plan times your child(ren) can interact with others (family members, club/activity, etc.)
- Monitor any social media use for older students.

7. Responsible Technology Use:

When completing work online, joining video calls and/or participating in virtual discussions, students should be sure to follow SOAR behavior and digital citizenship by:

- Using respectful behavior and language.
- Sticking to appropriate topic discussions.
- Sending only appropriate video transmissions.
- Using only appropriate icon, emoji, and avatars
- Wearing school appropriate clothing if attending meetings via video.
- Being honest and using academic integrity by submissions. not plagiarizing or copying others' work

8. Support Network

- Reach out to your child(ren)'s teacher and/or the school with questions.
- Consider who in your neighborhood might be able to be a support person.
- Are there situations when older siblings might be able to support the learning of younger children

Meals during Remote Learning

Available at schools and nearby locations

Ensuring kids have access to nutritious meals during the 2020-21 school year is a top priority. PSD Child Nutrition and the Transportation Departments have teamed up to make sure meals are available to students at several locations across the district.

Sack meals available for students

Please note that meal sites and hours may change as needs and the program are evaluated.

PSD offers sack meals from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., Monday through Friday, at numerous PSD schools and additional locations (on scheduled school days).

Students (any child 18 or younger) can get two sack meals - one sack lunch for that day and a sack breakfast for the following morning. Students do not have to be there in-person to receive meals.

Menus are available on the PSD website.

Cost: There is no cost for meals. Parents are encouraged to still apply for free and reduced-priced meals, which helps with school funding. For information or to apply, <u>visit the Free and Reduced-Priced Meals website</u>.

Meal sites - where to pick up PSD sack meals

Students, families and staff must wear face coverings and maintain social distancing at meal sites.

Sack meals will be available outside at several schools and at nearby mobile meal sites via parked school buses. Students may get meals at any location regardless of the school they attend or where they live.



Please remember any question you have – we are in our office hours from 3-4 each day and we would love to support you however we can.



- -Each camera icon on this schedule indicates a time your child should be in a live session.
- -Some students will attend additional live sessions when they are involved in small groups.

⇒ Classroom Management

-All students have participated in discussions reviewing appropriate and expected class behavior.

- -Some of these expectations include:
 - -Arrive on time and stay through the entire session.
 - -Turn camera on and microphone off.
 - -Use the chat bar appropriately.
 - -Actively participate in class discussions.
 - -Find a quiet and well-lit spot to focus on school work during
 - -Be aware of your background during meetings.
 - -Always show SOAR!
- ⇒ Google Classroom
 - Much of your child's classwork will be assigned in Google Classroom.
 - Ask your child to show you his or her assignments frequently.
- ⇒ Fridavs
 - We will always have a morning meeting at 8:55 am on Fridays.
 - We will not have live teaching sessions on Fridays after the meeting.
 - Students will have independent work to complete on Fridays.
